DAY 8

PEACE

A few days ago, one of my District Superintendent texted me in the middle of the night. "Gun firing has been outbreaking here in Tahan, in front of my house, and at the back of my house. And it also breaks out in another three areas. Your urgent prayer is needed."

Our Field Intercessory Prayer team began sharing this urgent prayer request and prayed for the protection of our pastors and our brothers and sisters. A few hours later, we received the good news that our prayer is answered and they are in peace.

Well, these are unusual situations. But our experiences for the past two years, were unusual circumstances especially due to Covid-19.

Many of our pastors and our brothers and sisters have been experiencing challenges in their lives. We are looking forward to another Advent season of the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. John chapter 20:19-20 talks about a little similar situation. Jesus Christ's disciples were kind of anxious and frustrated because the Jewish leaders were looking for them. And they do not know what to do in the middle of the night.

But at that night, Jesus Christ looked at the door and presented himself with the word: "Peace be with you." In that moment, the disciples received the genuine peace of our Lord Jesus Christ in the middle of the night. Nothing was changed but the presence of the Lord with the word, "Peace be with you".

I don't know what else to share in this Advent season except the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ, to bring the genuine peace for all of us. One of the other Myanmar pastors later texted us and shared his prayer. He says, "I do not know if we will ever be able to fathom why the good God would allow such things to happen to us. But my sincere prayer, is that God would let us see his good plans behind these tragedies. Dear friends, we're now looking for a better life on this earth as God's children. But I do like to ask your prayers that God would not allow this injustice to go on and that justice and peace will soon prevail in our country."

In this Advent season, in this Covid-19 pandemic, and this military coup in the country, what we have to look for is the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ that brings the genuine peace to our lives.

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.

A person only needs to spend a few minutes on the internet to learn the opposite of "peace-loving." Videos such as people losing their tempers on airplanes or grocery stores as well as ones that show violence that erupts with small provocations pop up on my video feed constantly. Peacemaking requires wisdom from heaven. On June 2021, I received a call as I was preparing for my Sunday School class. The caller was looking for my 15-year old daughter. DAY 13 BLESSED ARE THE PEACEMAKERS by Mitchel Modine - Professor, Asia-Pacific Nazarene Theological Seminary

I once heard a preacher praising his congregation for their efforts to feed the hungry in their city. He said there was still much work to do, however. An old woman seated a few rows ahead of me suddenly became angry. "If there are still hungry people here, then your congregation isn't doing enough," she said. I remember that the preacher remained calm but firm: he would not allow the size of the problem to lead them into despair.

I thought about this when I wondered about Jesus's promise that peacemakers will be called the children of God (Matthew 5:9). Scrolling through social media or the news reveals a world in turmoil: violence, murders, wars, coups, and pandemics seem to be without end. In the words one of the greatest Christmas hymns, "There is no peace on earth, I said / for hate is strong, and mocks the song / of peace on earth, good will to men!" Yet Jesus Christ, the Son of God, Immanuel, calls us not to despair. He calls us to be peacemakers and honors efforts in that direction. Though the task seems great, we should not be children of despair, but instead children of God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called Children of God.

DAY 14 THE ABSURDITY OF PEACE by CM Field Strategy Coordinator

Imagine with me the extreme nature, even absurdity, of Jesus' statement. Having already walked many days to Jerusalem, and having already purchased the sacrificial offering, first century Jews would not just stop in the middle of this important and costly act of worship. (You can color in your mental picture with the chaos of unattended pigeons and goats running around in the Temple). In this way, Jesus intensifies the command to seek reconciliation in our personal relationships. God so highly values reconciled relationships that, without them, our sacrificial gift, our spiritual act of worship, will be unacceptable and unpleasing to God. Worship that seeks to draw closer to God is meaningless if we have not first healed the broken relationships with our brothers and sisters.

Even more extreme—that which forces us to uncomfortable places—is that the cause of broken relationship in this situation is me: my anger, my mean and untruthful words, my disdain toward others, even others in the Church. It is not because someone else hurt me that I need to seek reconciliation. Rather, it is because I caused someone else to be hurt. To humbly admit your sin before another person is neither easy nor comfortable.

Yet, the Gospel for us, the Good News this Advent season, is that reconciliation and peace are God's gifts of grace to us. Because He has already created it, we can pursue it. Living in the peace of God, even when we have hurt someone, we can take the first step, confess our wrongdoing, and work for reconciliation. A difficult and extreme task is made possible through the extravagant grace of God.

As you come before the Lord today, does anyone have something against you? Do you have a broken relationship with anyone? What is the Lord calling you to do in order to make peace and be reconciled with your brother or sister?

Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother and sister has something against you, leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled to them; then come and offer your gift.
